Nationally acclaimed scholar and historical interpreter Susan Marie Frontczak creates a compelling portrayal that reveals Eleanor Roosevelt not only as a relentless voice for the powerless, but also as a mass communications genius – press conferences, newsreels, speeches, magazine and news columns, and books. Hear her speak for herself as she transforms the role of First Lady to become one of the most revered women of her generation. AAUW IBC and National News

On January 29, the Santa Clara County Interbranch Council of AAUW (IBC)* held a special meeting with Santa Clara County Supervisor, Cindy Chavez. San Jose branch had asked for her help in creating a yearlong celebration of the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment, which was passed on August 18, 1920, giving women all over the USA the right to vote. Supervisor Chavez responded with great support for the idea and will be asking the other members of the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors to provide funding to support the celebration with special events taking place from August 2019 through August 2020.

Supervisor Chavez will be meeting with members of all sorts of women's organizations during this year to form a steering group that will organize and promote the centennial celebration.



*Palo Alto branch is a member of AAUW's Santa Clara County Interbranch Council. The seven branches in Santa Clara County send representatives to meet four times a year to discuss common challenges and to celebrate our successes together. The other branches in our county are Gilroy, Morgan Hill, Los Altos-Mountain View, Los Gatos-Saratoga, Sunnyvale-Cupertino and San Jose.

Supervisor Cindy Chavez has praised the AAUW for their support of many of the actions of The Board of Supervisors. These include the approval of a resolution establishing the **Women's Equality 2020**Leadership Council. As we celebrate the centennial of women obtaining the right to vote we will be working to raise the level of voter engagement across the board. We will also make sure that our 2020 Census is accurate and we have the representation and resources we deserve. To stay engaged in this process email OWP@ceo.sccgov.org.

- ✓ Intimate Partner Violence programs have been funded with a 400% increase beginning July 1, 2018. That is a \$5M increase in funding with an additional \$5M proposed for January 1, 2019. This is a significant step in making sure our victims become survivors.
- ✓ The Historic Recognition of
 Women was approved with funding for
 projects in each district. The next step
 will be developing a committee structure
 and an opportunity for you to participate.
 Stay tuned!
- ✓ Rape Kits will now be processed faster than anywhere in the state. This sets a national model and assures victims of sexual assault that, no matter the circumstances, evidence in their case will be process rapidly.
- ✓ Foster Children will now be able to attend more summer enrichment and education programs through a pilot program that we have developed with partnerships with the City of San Jose and others. This supports foster families in our entire county.
