You will meet the Tech Trek girls from Palo Alto, Los Altos, and Mountain View middle schools who attended camp at CSU Sonoma or participated in the third year of virtual Tech Trek (for more see the Tech Trek article). On January 22, 2024, plan to attend the annual event to mark the anniversary of the SCOTUS Roe v Wade decision. We will hear about the status of reproductive rights in other states and what you can do to help those whose rights have been taken away.

In February 2024 members will be asked for generous donations to help middle school girls attend another successful Tech Trek camp.

In March we will hear from Jennifer Wolf, a senior Stanford lecturer of education, who will discuss the renewed push to ban books from U.S. schools and libraries. Book banning is a dilemma even for some California school districts. AAUW CA Public Policy is working with Equity California this year on its project to help women campaign for school boards who hold AAUW's mission of diversity, equity, and inclusion in education – including keeping all books available to any student who wants to read them. Also, in the spring of 2024 plan to participate in AAUW CA Lobby Days and participate in the opportunity to meet with legislators to promote AAUW CA supported legislation.

### ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL TECH TREK SUMMER! by Vicki Reeder and Natalie McClure



Twelve local Los Altos and Mountain View girls and six local Palo Alto girls had a unique and engaging experience with Tech Trek in-person and virtual camps in July, thanks to your generous

support! The girls were nominated by their science and math teachers from three Palo Alto or three Los Altos and Mountain View middle schools.

Camp Johnson at CA State University Sonoma took place the week of July 23-28. The camp is named for Katherine Johnson, a groundbreaking Black woman mathematician. Ms. Johnson mastered complex manual calculations and helped pioneer the use of computers to perform tasks at NASA. She was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015 by President Barack Obama.

From Los Altos and Mountain View the five girls who went to in-person Tech Trek at Sonoma State are Rachel Kim (Egan), Leah Jimenez, Maritza Guido Valdivia (Crittenden), Eliana Tekie, and Dagny Yavitch (Blach). The five girls from Palo Alto schools were Simren Arora (Fletcher), Maryel Elizondo Salgado, Kamilla Modesty Larios (Greene), and Sonika Gadgil, Shrishti Sinha (JLStanford).

Molly Mudgett, a former Palo Alto camper and counselor from Camp Hopper (Stanford), took time away from her job at Apple to come and teach a 5-day core class at Sonoma. Among other interactive sessions, girls explored to understand

water surface tension and built a wearable tech device as their final project.

Camper Eliana Tekie wrote, "I realized I want a career in STEM, more importantly, that I CAN have a career in STEM. I know now that there is a place for black girls like me in science and math, and I wouldn't have recognized that without Tech Trek. Thank you for nominating me."

For Virtual Tech Trek, also July 23-28, the students were provided a box of supplies prior to the program and then worked in virtual teams over Zoom to do the experiments and build their projects.

Palo Alto student Lisa Yang (Fletcher), Mountain View students Fiona Lee, Julia Mohan, Divya Sethuraman (Crittenden), and Los Altos students Madison Louie, Seona Sheth (Egan), Alex Pena, Zahra Mottaghian (Blach), completed the five-day virtual camp and made video reports of their projects, describing what they learned and who their "steminist" heroes are.

"The opportunity to attend virtual Tech Trek was amazing," wrote Julia Mohan in her thank-you note. "Before Tech Trek, I didn't know how to code, and I was scared to try because I thought I would be bad at it. Now I've realized that coding is really fun, and definitely something I want to pursue in my future." Julia's words are repeated in various forms by all the girls attending Tech Trek as they reflected on their experiences. See the videos describing their final projects: Palo Alto

#### **Did You Remember Pride Month?** by Kim Talbert, AAUW CA Public Policy Committee (revised)

AAUW CA encourages diversity, equity, and inclusion. Recall that until 1966 it was illegal to serve alcohol to a gay person, and until 1969, homosexuality was a criminal offense. On the morning of June 28, 1969, police raided the Stonewall Inn for the sale of illegal alcohol. As word got out, thousands of protestors came out and demonstrated for six days. These protests sparked the beginning of the Gay Liberation Movement. Since June 1970 Pride Month honors the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer or Questioning (LGBTQ+) people.

This year AAUW CA is supporting the "School Board Project" to promote leadership on school

boards that don't accept the ban on books about marginalized groups such as those dealing with gender identity, sexual orientation, and race.

Do you know that in 2016, President Obama established the first LGBTQ+ National Park in the 7.7 acres surrounding The Stonewall Inn? In 2019, the city of New York honored LGBTQ+ activists, Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, with a statue for their activism. According to the City of New York, this was the "first permanent, public artwork recognizing transgender women in the world."

Since the Stonewall Uprising, there have been many significant advances for the LGBTQ+ community, like same-sex marriage and the passage of the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 2009. There is still a long way to go for equitable treatment for all, but that's why it's exciting to work with an organization like AAUW on its mission of achieving a more equitable society. The Library of Congress has compiled a wonderful resource guide. LGBTQ+ Studies: A Resource Guide serves as an introduction into the excellent collection of LGBTQ+ resources available at the Library of Congress.



In a 2023 survey, our membership made it clear that they were alarmed by the nationwide movement to ban books and censor curricula in K-12 schools, particularly as this censorship denies students' access to historically accurate information pertaining to marginalized groups.

This is perhaps unsurprising as AAUW members' concern with access to high-quality education has been long standing. When AAUW was founded in 1881, its stated purpose was "for practical"

education work, for collection and publication of statistical and other information concerning education, and in general, for the maintenance of high standards of education."

Today, AAUW California continues to support this purpose in the second pillar of our Public Policy Priorities, "Equal Access to Quality Public Education for all Students." Under this second pillar an important bullet point, "Access to diverse staff and curriculum that represents historically accurate information" was added. In furtherance of that goal, the Public Policy Committee has established "The School Board Project" (SBP) designed to ensure school boards up and down the state include members who are committed to "the maintenance of high standards of education" for all students — including access to diverse and historically accurate information.

Whether you are aware of problematic censorship happening in your district, you fear it may be coming, or you just want to learn more about what AAUW California is doing, we hope you will join us virtually on September 21st at 7pm for the presentation of "Book Banning and Curricula Censorship in California? AAUW California to the Rescue!" that will explain the project and how all AAUW California members can help.

Representatives from our collaborative partners will attend to help you understand why this project is so important. Members from the League of Women Voters will provide guidance on how to speak out effectively and civilly at school board meetings. We hope to see you there.

AAUW's policy work connects and rallies advocates at the local, state, national, and global levels to empower women and girls. We use lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women. In 2022-23, AAUW dispersed \$6.3M for women pursuing advanced studies or organizing community action projects.
